Merry Christmas!



Contaminated Treats

Contaminated treats continue to an issue in the news and should definitely be on your radar! Tainted treats are causing health problems and in some cases even death. When the dog survives, it is often left with auto-immune deficiencies. In other cases the dog continues to suffer from ongoing seizures.

The majority of tainted treats appear to always contain ingredients that have been imported from China. Chicken jerky is one of the biggest culprits.

If you are going to buy ready-made treats, it is imperative that you READ THE LABEL

carefully! It must list all ingredients, and



originating source. You should ensure all ingredients and packaging originated in either the USA or Canada. Sometimes it might say manufactured or packaged in the USA, but leaves it open as to where the ingredients came from or

where it was actually made.

Regardless, if you want to be really safe ... prepare your own treats. There are hordes of recipes on the Internet for dog treats and they are not hard to prepare.

Choosing your own ingredients puts you in charge! You can prepare large batches and freeze some so you will have them later We will be posting some recipes in our next newsletter. We prefer to try them out first to give you firsthand information as to whether the dogs will eat them and if they are easily prepared.

This guarantees the safety of your Chow!

What is the Best Dog Food?

We all want to feed our pets food that will be best for their overall health. However, honestly ... which one is it? There are so many food products on the market and they all claim the same thing. Even asking your veteri-

nary isn't always helpful, especially if they also sell a brand of dog food. Of course, they are going to recommend their product! The logical solution might be for you to take the label in for your veterinary to evaluate. The problem with this can be that your veterinary really hasn't studied the nutrition of canines in particular and especially not for a specific breed. Great! Now what? There are basic analyses coming from research that you can easily find on the Internet. Meat should be the first ingredient. But, which is best? Fish? Chicken? Lamb? Beef? Wild game? I would submit that a variety is the best. Just as we humans do best when consuming a variety of food, there are beneficial nutrients that each has to offer.

Vegetables are the next factor. No, dogs don't typically eat vegetables right from the garden, but in the wild, they eat game

"Nutrition will determine how healthy your dog is and their longevity." that still has the vegetables in their gut which is consumed. They are important. And, just as in humans, the darker or richer the color, the greater nutritional value. Sweet potatoes are something our dogs enjoy and added

to their food is very good for them. Green beans, peas, red beets, etc. are all vegetables having great nutritional value. All manufactured dog foods contain a filler in them. It can be a variety of grain; corn or wheat. There are studies that suggest wheat in a dog's diet is not a good thing. Some wheat is okay but when it is consumed everyday, it can have adverse effects on dogs. So, rice is the preferred filler. It seems dogs can digest it easily and there does not appear to be any adverse affects noted. There are many good dog foods out there. Just be an educated consumer. Some have too much filler and should be avoided, The dog doesn't gain anything from it and it passes straight through their body. These are typically the lower prices, and/or offbrand dog foods. There are many that are very expensive and you would think they

should be best. However, that is not always true! Reading the labels and using common sense is your best bet. Some dogs do best when fed the same thing all the time. You can add variety by giving them treats with sweet potatoes, blue berries, etc. These will provide additional antioxidants to their diet. Some do fine changing the meat variety but staying with the same brand. These are our "Chowdren". We need to pay special attention to what is best for them and not what is easiest for us.

Having a pet is a commitment. They did not ask to come to our home. By taking them home with us, we have promised them that we will take the best care possible for them. Nutrition is a primary factor in how healthy your dog is and directly affects their longevity.

We all know how painful it is to lose a beloved pet. Do your best to stave off that time by providing the best nutrition possible for your Chow family member. Remember, a healthy dog is a happy dog!
