### **Puppy's Paws**

The pads of puppies feet are very sensitive and soft when they are young. However, they will become very durable over time.

As puppies, they may be sensitive to hot surfaces during the summer and exposure to caustic materials in the winter.

In the hot summer months, check asphalt or concrete surfaces before setting your puppy down. If it is too hot to the touch of your hand, it will be too hot for their paws. Hot surfaces such as these may cause blisters.

In the harsh winter months, caustic materials such as road salt and sand may irritate their pads and also their mouth and belly. Puppies often will chew

on their paws to clean them and get the salt into their mouth. Of course, their bellies can have salt kicked up on them. Make sure you clean the feet and belly after being outside. This will help prevent irritation.

If their paws appear dry or cracked, you can use petroleum jelly to soften and moisturize them. Vitamin E or Aloe are also good especially in the summer months.

Keep the hair between the toes trimmed to prevent it from collecting debris, and if necessary ... trim their nails. Long nails can be painful to walk on.

You should inspect your puppy's paws on a regular basis to ensure they are

healthy. Chows are typically stoic when it comes to pain. You may not notice something is wrong until it is already serious. Regular inspections will prevent this and allow you to take care of any issues before they become a major problem. You are the main protector of your puppy's welfare!

# Feelings of Guilt and Remorse?

Dogs do not feel guilt in the way humans do. Dogs live in the moment. If they have done something wrong, they don't know it is wrong. Only if you catch them in the act can you correct a behavior.

If you come home to find your dog has chewed on shoes or gone through the trash, it does no good to try to correct him after the fact. He may cower and hide, but this only in response to your behavior ... not

the incident at hand.

We have had dogs that immediately hid when we entered our home. I have often believed they know what they have done. But research shows this may not be the case.

You cannot take the chance of punishing your dog for something, if you are not absolutely sure he understands what the correction is for. It is no different than a toddler. If you catch them playing with the light socket you can correct them. But, to show them the light socket and scold them makes little sense to them.

Dogs are very intelligent, but they don't remember things they have already done. Catch them in the act or leave it alone. You don't want to inadvertently create fear and/or confusion for your dog.

#### The Pros & Cons of Chew Bones

We all like to give our pets treats. Chewing is a natural behavior of canines so giving them something to chew on is good. It also helps keep their teeth in a good healthy condition.

"Kongs" are a good choice. You can stuff them with cheese or peanut butter and then freeze them. It will keep your pooch occupied for hours. Beef bones are another good option. You can get these from your butcher or meat department. Buy only large bones. It is best to boil them and then let them cool completely. Boiling them kills off bacteria and cooling allows the bones to harden.

The chewing cleans plaque and tarter off the teeth and keeps the gums healthy. Dogs would do this in the wild so it is a good thing to provide.

Stay away from any bones that might splinter. This can be very dangerous. That is why chicken bones are never a good idea.

Healthy teeth and gums are an integral part of a healthy dog.

Keep an eye on those pearly whites to promote good health in your dog.

### **Gardening Precautionary Tips for Spring**

As we head towards spring, many of us are beginning to plan for our gardens. It is important to keep your pets in mind during your planning.

Some mulch, like cocoa mulch, can be hazardous and even fatal to our furry friends.

Fertilizers can be a definite hazard, whether applying to your garden, flowers or your lawn. Be careful to prevent your pet from coming into contact with liquid fertilizers. They are likely to lick their paws and may ingest some of the fertilizer. This will wreak havoc with their intestinal tract.

Insecticides can also be a hazard if it gets on the animal's skin or is ingested. Keep all chemicals out of reach of your pet. You would be surprised at how many dogs have punctured a can with their teeth.

Certain types of plants need to

be considered when planning your garden space. Some plants are hazardous to animals. Rhododendron and Azaleas are both toxic to dogs. We have both in our yard and our dogs have never bothered them. We do keep puppies away from them though.
