Is He Sick?

How do you know when your dog is sick? With Chows, that can be very tricky.

Chows rarely whine or let you know they are in pain. They can be very stoic. Here are some signs that your Chow may not be feeling good.

Lethargic. If you notice a decrease in activity and your Chow is laying down more than usual or keeping to themselves more than normal.

Lack of appetite. When a Chow is sick they often go off their food completely. When this happens it is time to go to the veterinary. By the time they are off their food they definitely have something going on that needs attention.

Checking your Chows temperature is also a good indicator. We use a digital thermometer. We take the temperature rectally, first coating the thermometer with Vaseline or A&D Ointment.

Normal temperature range is 100 to 102.5 degrees Fahrenheit. After use, make sure you disinfect the thermometer with alcohol so it's ready for the next time.

Normally you will notice when your Chow isn't acting up to par or abnormal behavior. Don't ignore the symptoms and take immediate action when necessary. "It isn't always easy to tell when a Chow is sick."

Heartworm Season is Approaching

For the colder seasonal climates, heartworm season is fast approaching. You will want to start the heartworm medications early enough for them to become effective before the mosquitoes start buzzing.

Heartworms are debilitating. Initial signs include lethargy and an unwillingness to expend energy. This will progress to heart pain in advanced stages.

No one wants their pet to have to go through the necessary treatments for heartworm. The side affects of the treatment can be severe. Advanced stages of heartworm can often be fatal. Heartworms can cause a very painful death.

Protect your dog by putting it on heartworm medication. Many treatments are admin-

istered only once a month, so it isn't time consuming or difficult.

Check with your veterinarian for the correct dosage and to answer any specific questions you may have.

Don't let the mosquito season catch you unprepared!

Macee's mom had questions about worming and heartworm medicine. Continued worming is not necessary if your puppy has tested negative for worms. We worm all of our dogs once a year. We only do it more often if we find evidence of a problem. Lactating mothers are wormed more often.

Heartworm medication is very important, but when do you start it? In Macee's case, the mosquito season is over so I recommend she start her medication in March. This will give her body time to absorb the medication and be ready for the mosquito season which normally starts in May in northern climate regions (check your own area).

We try not to medicate puppies any earlier than necessary.
