#### WHAT MAKES CHOWS SO GREAT?

This is a rhetorical question for those of us who have been adopted by a Chow. But, let me elaborate on the positive characteristics of the Chow breed.

This is by no means an all inclusive list, but the things that come immediately to mind are:

- They do not need a large exercise area. Chows are a non-working breed, so they are quite content to lay in the room with you ... along with regular time outside or on walks.
- They are not socially needy. Chows like to be around you, but they don't have to be on you. Ours usually comes up

to us and stands there looking up until we pet them. Then they go lay down of their own accord. They are just not demanding.

- They do not overeat dry food. You do not have to ration their dry food to prevent weight gain.
- They are protective of their family. As long as they have been properly socialized, they will take their queues from you about how they should react to strangers.
- They are clean. Chows are very cat-like. They do not have the doggy odor many breeds have. Baths are only needed if they get in the mud or

roll in something while outside. Regular brushings are really all that is required.

- Their medium-size build is ideal for most environments. They are not too large, but are large enough to truly be a good protector.
- They are a very healthy breed. Chows are predisposed to eye entropian, elbow dysplasia and hip dysplasia. They can acquire other health issues, just like we humans, but not disproportionate to other breeds.

Chows are such a special breed. We obviously love them & feel they would do well in most any environment.. "There are many positive characteristics of a Chow"
