

Dewclaws don't have to be removed. Just keep an eye on them for any potential problems. Chows rarely have issues with

them.

Should we or shouldn't we remove Dewclaws?

We get a lot of questions about dewclaws. Should you have them removed or not?

We do not have the dewclaws removed on our puppies. Chows rarely have any issues with their dewclaws. They are protected with the fur around them. Unlike short-haired dogs, who can easily catch their dewclaw on something and tear it loose.

Dewclaws are thought to be left over digits from prehistoric times. In many dogs they have no use, but some dogs actually use their dewclaws to help grasp a toy or bone. Chows rarely, if ever, have dewclaws on their hind legs. Only on the front legs.

Dewclaw removal can be problematic if not done prior to eight weeks of age. In many dogs, Chows being one of them, the dewclaw is actually attached to the bone. This requires major surgery to have it removed. Past eight weeks of age, the chance of infection rises dramatically. Our recommendation? Unless there is a problem just leave them alone. If it is not broke, don't fix it.

You do need to check their dewclaws on a regular basis

and trim if needed. The nail can become a problem if it curls when it grows. It can become embedded into the leg and removal will be necessary. If you see the nail is growing long, keep it trimmed. Trim it the same as any other nails. They may not use this digit any longer, but it definitely has nerves and feeling. Many Chows self groom the dew claws by chewing back the nail and keeping it the correct length.

Keeping an eye on them is all that is needed to prevent any potential problems.

Our 3-Year Health Guarantee Update Notice

We have updated our Health Guarantee on our website. It also includes the disclaimer of the guarantee being voided in the event we close the kennel. This isn't something we expect to do anytime soon, but one never knows what the future may hold. We aren't getting any younger.

Our auarantee is very important to us. It reflects the confidence we have in our breeding dogs and program. It also makes clear our desire to produce healthy puppies and demonstrate responsible accountability for our kennel. We take great care in establishing breeding pairs, never breeding dogs from the same bloodlines. This is something we disagree with many "show kennels", who in their quest to maintain a subjective appearance, sometimes engage in the practice of Inbreeding to accomplish that goal. However, doing this can bring the recessive genes to the surface and produce many unwanted traits to include obvious health issues. We are very attentive to the nutrition we provide to our breeding dogs and puppies. Regardless of the best precautionary measures,

Mother Nature's plan takes precedence and the results do not always turn out the way we want and puppies can still develop genetic disorders. Our goal is the minimize those risks as much as possible!

We know what it is like to become attached to a puppy as it matures, only to discover something is physically wrong that cannot be fixed. This can be devastating! The next best option is management of the health problem, but there are times when this isn't possible either. This is when our health guarantee becomes very important. No one can ever replace a beloved pet, but a new puppy can often times fill the void left behind.

With our <u>one-time</u> replacement policy, comes some stipulations to make that feasible. We will try to replace your puppy with the same color and sex, if you so desire. But, providing us with a second color preference may allow us to provide you with a puppy much sooner. So, a second color choice must be provided. If you insist on the same color, you are accepting the fact that it may be several months

before we can provide you a replacement puppy. Our guarantee does <u>not</u> mean you will receive the next puppy available, nor right of pick. We often have several clients on our Waiting Lists, some may have been waiting several months. We have to consider them as well.

With all living creatures and things, there are very few guarantees in life. We obviously cannot guarantee our puppies for their entire life. We have discussed this with several of our veterinarians and have done extensive research. We cannot guarantee things that are obviously out of our control, but what we can guarantee is in the event something does go wrong, we will show compassion, offer advice and if necessary, provide a replacement puppy. We feel that our guarantee is fair and our veterinarians feels it is very generous. They have shared that they know very few breeders willing to guarantee their puppies and certainly do not go beyond the first six months to one year. They have even questioned why we would want to guarantee our

puppies until their third birthday. Maybe we are old school, but we believe that we have to show confidence in our dogs and our guarantee is our way of doing this. No one can guarantee that bad things won't happen in life, but we can guarantee that in the event that these bad things do occur, we vow to be responsible breeders, and loyal friends of our clientele to work through them on a case by case basis! This is called integrity!


