Homemade Dog Treats?

Last month we shared with you ongoing problems concerning some tainted dog treats. Some were alleged to have caused sickness and even death to household pets.

I pledged to test some homemade treats on our dogs and post the recipe, along with the results.

They were actually simple to prepare. They took approximately one hour to make. Our participating dog tasters were Char Char, Laddie, Jack, Gabriel, & China. All approved and wanted more.

The recipe is as follows:

Preheat your oven to 350 degrees Fahrenheit

Whisk two eggs and 1/2 cup of pumpkin together in a large bowl.

Add 2 tablespoons of dry milk.

1/4 teaspoon sea salt

2 1/2 Cups rice flour

1 teaspoon parsley flakes (optional)

(It calls for brown rice flour. I didn't have that so I used white rice flour. You can use regular wheat flour, but some dogs don't do well on wheat so rice is much easier to digest.)

Thoroughly mix all the ingredients. I used my hands since it proved much easier. It didn't call for any other liquid, but it appeared too dry to make into dough, so I added water until I had a consistency that I could roll out with my rolling

pin.

Roll out the dough until it is 1/4 to 1/2 inch thick.
Cut the dough out using a cookie cutter or cut into squares to a size of your own choosing.

Bake on a cookie sheet for 20 minutes. Remove, flip over and then bake another 20 minutes.

Once cooled, I put them in a plastic container to keep them fresh. I don't know how long they will last, but I think they are dry enough they shouldn't mold anytime soon.

All the dogs seemed to really like them and the pumpkin is a great antioxidant!



Yogi Bear is a very special puppy from Dixie & Kaiser.

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
Independence Rayna in Vermont

Cash Bear Gongaware in Pennsylvania




Cash gets a lot of looks wherever he
