Summertime

Summertime brings fun times but precautions need to be taken for the welfare of your pet.

Heat is always a concern, especially for Chows. Make sure your pet has plenty of water and shade to get out of the sun. On extremely hot days, if possible, take then inside. Chows typically fare pretty well in the heat. Ones with black coats do need extra attention paid. That black fur absorbs the heat and they can suffer from heatstroke more quickly.

We do not recommend you shave your Chow. But, if you do, make sure you don't cut the fur so close that the skin is subject to sunburn. Chows have skin that is very sensitive to sun. They are a double-coated breed and their skin is not meant to be exposed.

Care should be taken when having outdoor barbeques. Alcohol is not good for your



dog and can cause severe health issues. Be careful that drinks are not left where your curious four legged friend can get to them.

Human snacks can cause severe intestinal upset when dogs are not used to them. This can be just as unpleasant for you as it is for your dog! So, advise your friends not to succumb to that sweet face asking for a treat.

Cintronella and other pest deterrent coils and oils should be kept away from dogs and especially puppies.

Beestings can cause sever reactions. Many dogs like to snap at bees. This should be avoided.

A little care and attention will result in a happy, healthy summer.

When Things Go Very Wrong

This past weekend tragedy struck our kennel. Misty went into labor on Friday and had a puppy around 5:00 pm. Unfortunately, it was dead when I found it. She didn't have another puppy by 9:00 pm so we had to make a trip to the Emergency Veterinary Hospital. After checking her out they decided not to do a cesarean section. Instead they wanted to wait to see if she could have them on her own. They said they could feel a puppy in the birth canal and sent us home.

As I drove into the driveway I could hear Misty having a puppy in the kennel cage. I jumped out, grabbed a towel, and began working on the puppy. It was stillborn.

I moved Misty into the kennel and began the vigil of watching and waiting. About three hours later she had another puppy. Again, it was stillborn.

Misty laid down and went to sleep. She was exhausted. At 8:00 am I took her to our normal clinic where they proceeded to give her oxytocin to help with the contraction. Still no puppies so they decided to do a cesarean. Misty was really exhausted by this time and there was real concern about

putting her under anesthesia. As you know, Chows don't do well under anesthesia under the best of circumstances. Now you have a dog who is exhausted which affects their breathing anyway.

They delivered two puppies. Both were alive but one died shortly after birth. The other appeared to be healthy. Each of the puppies were covered in a yellow grit. The veterinary thinks it might be some type of infection but had never seen anything like it before.

The last puppy eventually died two days later. Obviously, something wasn't right.

In hindsight, I should have insisted on the cesarean section at the Emergency Veterinary Hospital. If we had gotten to the puppies sooner we might have been able to save some of them. And, it would have been much easier on Misty in the long run.

I tell you this story to illustrate that things do not always turn out as we hope. Misty is only five years old, healthy, and has successfully delivered puppies before. Many people want their female to deliver one litter so their children can experience the miracle of birth. This is one instance that I

would not have wanted any children present to witness. It would have been impossible to explain this tragedy when I can't explain it to myself.

Fortunately, Misty is doing fine. It was really rough on her and her uterus was in bad shape. Again, they think that whatever the problem was affected her uterus. So, we decided to have her spayed. She is more important to us than having more puppies. She will now move to the front yard after she heals to become one of our "pet pack".
