This article written by Jennifer Fields lists several potentially hazardous and even lethal items that are common in most households.

Grapes and Raisins can cause kidney failure in dogs and cats.

Bread Dough may cause severe abdominal pain and even death if eaten by pets. The heat of the animal's body causes the dough to rise.

Chewing Gum often contains an artificial sweetener, Xylitol, which can be deadly to pets. The sweetener can cause a low-blood sugar crisis in your pet. One pack of gum can kill a dog.
Nicotine is highly toxic and can cause seizures, coma, and even death. Pets prone to chewing items left out, may ingest cigarettes.

Chocolate is very toxic to
dogs and can cause vomiting, diarrhea, excessive thirst and urination, hyperactivity, abnormal heart rhythm, tremors, seizures and even death.

Alcohol can cause seizures, heart arrhythmia, vomiting, coma and death. So, don't leave those half empty glasses around after a party.

Pain Relievers intended for humans are not to be used for your pets. One
tablet of Acetaminophen can kill a cat.

Tea often has caffeine in it and can lead to the same reactions as Chocolate.

Onions are toxic to dogs and cats. Be careful tossing that sandwich or piece of steak to your pet if there are onions on it.

## Inbreeding ... Line Breeding ... Outcross Breeding ???



When purchasing a puppy it is always a good idea to inquire about the parental bloodlines. Not all breeders are aware of breeding protocols and some choose to ignore them.

After much research, we have found no clear delineation between Inbreeding versus Line Breeding. It appears to be a very subjective and controversial issue. The following is what we have come up with after several discussions with many veterinarians and the research we have done.

Inbreeding: An inbred dog is one that has common bloodlines on both the
immediate paternal and maternal side. This happens within the nuclear family when a sister and brother, a mother and son, or a father and daughter are bred together. Although this is a common practice with "Show Kennels", this close inbreeding often brings recessive genes to the forefront which can result in health problems.

Line breeding: is when there is a common bloodline somewhere in the extended family tree. For example, Breeders will sometimes breed a dog to an aunt or uncle.

Outcross Breeding: is when two dogs from completely different bloodlines are bred together.

We at D \& M Farm Kennel do not practice inbreeding! We have done some line breeding after we thoroughly discussed this with our veterinarians. We mostly breed dogs of completely separate bloodlines.

When you are ready to purchase a puppy, ask to see the pedigree of the parents. A little research may help avoid having to deal with health problems down the road.
