Did You Know . . .

The origin of the Chow can be dated back to around 150 B.C. That was during the Han Dynasty in China. It is said that the Chow Chow originated in the Artic and then migrated to Mongolia and China.

During this period they were used for hunting, guard dogs, and also used for meat and fur.

In 1833 Chow Chows were brought to England and kept in cages as wild dogs for exposition. Eventually, they were domesticated and became pets.

Some of the famous owners of Chows include President Calvin Coolidge, Sigmund Freud, Elvis Presley, and Martha Stewart.

Chow puppies are born with 44 teeth while all other ca-

nine breeds only have 42. They are a double coated breed. The only other breed that has the blue/black tongue is the Chinese Shar-



Pei which is a descendant of the Chow.

Chows are the only breed with the straight back legs that give them, what some refer to as, a stilted gait. There are only five colors which include red, black, cream, cinnamon, and blue. Reds come in many variations from dark mahogany to a light red with lots of cream in the coat. Cinnamon is a misnomer for the color. It is not the color of the spice. Instead, it is a fawn ... beige brown color. Cream is an offwhite with buff color on the ears and sometimes down the back. Blue is actually gray in color from charcoal to silver.

Chows are unique in their appearance as well as their personality. They are known as the felines of the canine world. Not surprising since they resemble a lion or bear more than a dog. They are very loyal and affectionate without being needy. Some say they are aloof. Really they are just independent. They are born old and wise with a touch of mischief, you can see it in their eyes.

We all know how Chows don't show pain. Checking their teeth and gums becomes all that more important. Without regular checks a serious condition could develop before you are aware of it.

You should check for loose or broken teeth and for red and/ or swollen gums. Bad breath can also be an indicator of infection or gum disease. As dogs age, plaque and tarter can become a problem. Young dogs can loosen teeth by playing too rough. Baby teeth are nothing to worry about. But, permanent teeth must be kept in good condition. Older dogs can also break teeth off. This will expose the dentin and is very painful.

You can brush your dogs teeth to remove the plaque and tarter. You should start this when they are very young. Older dogs often take exception to this practice. And Chows will think you have lost your mind!

We prefer to use chew toys, bones, and chew sticks to remove the unwanted debris left on teeth. Large bones from the butcher are great and the dogs love them. Dry dog food and treats such as Milk Bones all help to scrape off tarter and plaque.

Monthly checks will keep you informed of any potential problems and keep your dog in good condition.

Ahhhh Yes! Massages Are Great!!!!!

One of the greatest things you can do for your puppy or adult dog is massage. There are so many benefits to this practice and your dog will come to look forward to it and love it.

Massaging your dog creates trust and promotes bonding with your canine. It is also a very relaxing process for the dog. This is especially great for a dog that isn't feeling well. It promotes circulation which promotes healing.

It will give you, the dog owner, an opportunity to detect any abnormal bumps or lumps. Just as in humans, early detection of disorders is key to diagnosing, treating, and recovery.

Start by using both your hands on either side of the



head and begin kneading. Feel the ears all the way to the tips and then begin moving down the body. After you have massaged the entire trunk, begin massaging each leg.

Dogs will often go to sleep during this process. It will completely relax them. The first few times you do it, you may have to convince them it is a good thing. But once they have it figured out ... don't be surprised when your dog comes to you with those soulful eyes begging for a massage.
