was waiting for our arrival. What a beautiful boy he is. We thank you Jim for going out of your


way to make our day so special.

D & M Farm Happenings

We are in full swing at the farm getting ready for winter. We have harvested the honey from the hives. We will extract the honey, bottle & package D&M Farm honey soon. We have added tarps to the pheasant enclosures to provide them more protection during wintry weather. Heat lamps have been replaced in the hen house, it's been cleaned, and new straw placed in the nests. The calves have their own building ... complete with a heat lamp to take the chill off. They have a deep bed of straw to keep them warm. We are still bottle feeding them. They have another month before we can wean them off. We have bed down the outside doghouses with straw. The heated buckets are in place. The puppies have been moved back inside, since wet and cold weather has arrived. New sawdust has been put in the horse stalls so they will have a warm dry

place when needed. The pool has been closed for the year and we have cleaned out the raised beds in the garden and tidied up the greenhouse.

Lots of work this time of year. But, it is also a beautiful time with the beautiful colors of the fall leaves. The



smell of the dried leaves conjures the thoughts of being snug by the fire on cold nights. The stores are full of Christmas decorations. We always hope to get ahead of the game, but it rarely happens. We make our mad dash at the last minute like so many.

Darrell and I were outside the other day looking over the farm. We were reflecting on how blessed we feel to have our farm, the kennel, and all the many friends we have made through our Chow kennel.
