## What Is Healthy Food?

It is important to determine what is healthy for human consumption, but equally important to know what is best for our pets. We strive to feed them the best food we can. Now, what does that mean?

I found an article in *The Natural Dog* magazine by Diana Laverdure that may help answer that question.

She states that you can't rely on the description on the label. The terms "Natural", "premium", "holistic", and "humangrade" do not mean much, but are intended to lead you to believe otherwise. These words are not defined by the FDA, (Federal Drug Administration), so they really don't do not address the quality of the food.

"Organic" is defined and certified. The bag must bear the USDA Organic seal to be valid.

The best indicator is the ingredient listing. The first ingredient should reflect what comprises the bulk of the contents. So, meat should be listed first. Whether it is beef, lamb, or chicken it should not say byproducts. You want the real thing. Next should be fruits and veggies which will contain antioxidants. Grains should be glutenfree. Preservatives should be natural, such as vitamins

C and E.

Avoid sugar, artificial colors, flavors, or preservatives.

Varying your pet's diet can be beneficial as well. By changing the type of protein you can ensure they are



getting a balance of nutrients. No one single food contains everything needed, so a variation can help ensure a balanced diet.

Changing your pet's food may cause gastrointestinal upset if done abruptly. It is always safer to mix the new food with the old food at a 50/50 ratio for a week, to allow your pet to become accustomed to the new food slowly. If you stay within the same dog food line and are only changing from lamb to chicken it is unlikely to cause a problem.

You can supplement your dry dog food with canned dog food and treats. This is another way to make sure your pet is getting all necessary nutrients.

There are kits of recipes on the web for creating homemade treats. This permits you to control what goes into the treat and how it is processed.

Be careful not to be lulled into things that sound good to us. Our system has different needs than our pet. Look for those things that are good for a dog. Do some research. There is lots of information out there at your fingertips. A little knowledge can go a long way in making better choices for our pets.

Take your food label to your veterinary. He should be able to assist you in determining if the food quality is mediocre or really good! There are more and more nutritionists for animals these days. If you can find one, pick their brain.

Common sense goes a long way. You don't have to be a scientist to read "real" ingredients and decide if they make sense. If you can't pronounce it, it probably isn't something you really want in your dog's diet.

Our pets are our responsibility. Most can't go out and eat wild game. They only have what we make available. So, do some research and provide the best you can afford. Those bright, clear eyes will thank you for it with a wagging tail!.

# Additional Supplements ... Needed or Not?

Most veterinarians would say that all dogs do not need additional supplements. But they sometimes can be beneficial to some dogs. If you feed the same dog food all the time ... giving additional supplements can fill in the gaps.

For example, adding a small amount of vegetable oil to your dog's food can be great for their coat and digestion. Adding an

egg can provide additional protein that may also enhance the appearance of their coat, as well as adding additional nutrients to their diet.

Some healthy treats can provide additional nutrients. Sweet potato treats or any treats with vegetables or fruits are beneficial. You can also give treats that provide more protein. Try to give a protein treat that is from a different meat than their primary dog food. Again, it is all about providing a well-rounded healthy diet and providing your pet with variety. Their bodies may react adversely to getting the same foods all the time and allergies can develop over time.


Therefore, variety really is the spice of life! Provide that in your pet's diet for a more happy and healthier pet.


