First they are bathed with puppy or baby shampoo. This shampoo is the mildest and won't sting the eyes. After the puppy is completely rinsed it is towel dried and then the blow dryer is used. The blow dryer is sometimes met with resistance until the puppy determines it really isn't going to eat them. It is important to set the heat on warm or cool. The puppy's skin is very sensitive. Keep the blow dryer moving the entire time you are using

Baths take place the day of shipment when possible, but for early morning flights the bath is done the night before.

We think it makes the puppy feel good just like we do when we are all clean and dressed in nice clothes.

Clear the Rear!

Chows with lots of fur and feathering around their rear end need to be examined and groomed often. There are times the hair can get crusted with feces and pretty soon the anal area can become raw. This is obviously very uncomfortable for the dog and very unsanitary. It is not always obvious this is happening.

Lack of grooming this area can draw flies and result in maggots. As disgusting as this sounds it can be harmful for the dog.

Trimming this area is often a two person job. Some dogs take exception to being trimmed in this area. I prefer to trim with scissors rather than shaving the area.

Obviously, frequent grooming will prevent most problems. Some dogs do not like to be groomed in this area, but it's necessary. Summers are the worst time for problems to arise remain observant.

Matting Requires Immediate Attention

Mats are not only unsightly, but may cause harm to your pet. As the hair mats, it can become tight against the skin and eventually cut off circulation.

Mats can become painful. Chows are notorious for getting mats behind their ears. Even with regular grooming you may notice mats forming. It's

that soft, fine hair.

If you find a mat that is tight against the skin, begin by cutting the mat with scissors being very careful not to cut the skin. Use a comb or rake to try and break up the mat. Continue to trim with scissors. Sometimes a detangling liquid can be sprayed on the mat to help loosen it.

Using electric clippers is not recommended if the mat is tight against the skin. It is too easy to cut the skin or cause razor burn. One bad experience and your dog will duck for cover if he sees clippers or scissors!

So, inspect often for any mats forming and take care of them immediately.
