Chows & Entropia - What is Entropia?

Entropia is the inward turning of an eyelid causing irritation to the eye by the lashes. Unfortunately, the Chow Chow breed is predisposed to this condition. The founding sire of the breed had Entropia, so it is a predisposition more than a genetic issue. Even if both parents show no indications, it can still appear in their offspring. We have been very fortunate with our bloodlines, that Entropia has shown up only a few times in all of the puppies we have produced.

Sometimes, Entropia is diagnosed when it is really something else. For example, a simple and temporary eye infection

As Chow puppies mature, the development of their tear ducts

don't always keep up with their sudden growth spurts. You may notice tearing. This is because the duct is either blocked or isn't large enough yet to function properly. Often you will see this alternate between the eyes or come and go in one eye. Not all veterinarians are familiar with this. The puppies will normally outgrow this condition.

If you notice a discoloration to the tearing, then most likely there is an infection ongoing. It will often appear milky, with yellow or green mucous. By the time it is yellow or green, it is a full blown infection. This is easily treated with an antibiotic.

Entropia will cause constant tearing and will not go away. The inward rolling of the eyelid cause the lashes to actually touch the eye. This causes the irritation. Generally, you can tell if Entropia is developing, by taking your thumb and pulling downward on the skin below the eye. You may then ascertain whether the lid is rolled inward.

Having all of these conditions checked by a chow knowledgeable and qualified veterinary is the best course of action. Being aware of these different conditions, can enhance your position as a pet owner to be more involved in your puppies

Entropia will normally manifest itself very early, and definitely before the puppy is a year old. If treated while young, it will only take a single stitch, known as an eye tack, to correct the

Those Cute Little Ears

Chows are not prone to ear infections but it can happen.

Ear infections can normally be detected by how your Chow acts. Chows are very stoic by nature so don't expect whining or crying. But, they will shake their head or frequently scratch at their ear. The ear may look moist inside and often will make the hair around the ear look wet which is from the excess wax production. It is important not to get water inside the ear during bathes. The moisture will create an excellent environment for bacteria to grow.

If infections are left untreated it can become a chronic condition.

In some dogs ear infections are believed to be caused by allergies. If your Chow suffers from chronic ear infections ask your veterinary about allergy medicine for your dog.

Dominant Behavior

Dominant behavior exhibited by your dog towards humans is never acceptable. Sometimes it appears to be cute, but can eventually manifest itself into unwanted and sometimes dangerous behavior.

It is important to set boundaries for your puppy very early. The longer you wait, the harder it will become.

You should begin teaching patience, which also teaches a puppy who is in charge. This can be done by making them sit and then offer them a treat. It's tough for a puppy, just like a child, to wait for things. They must be taught patience.

Another exercise is to make them sit while you are preparing their food and not allow them to go to the bowl until you say it is okay. This will take some patience on your part as well, but it is well worth it in the long run. A puppy should be made to wait by the door and not permitted to run out until you say it is okay. This is for safety, as well as training them to follow your lead. Chows are very intelligent and will learn very quickly. But, they are also willful, so they won't always do what they know they are being asked to do, until the exercise has been repeated several times.

They should also wait to be asked to get into your lap, jump up on you, or when allowed to get up on the furniture. These are all boundaries that also show who is in charge. All members of the family should be involved, so your puppy will follow the lead of all the family members.

I recommend the excellent book by Cesar Milan, "Being the Pack Leader". It explains how you can train your dog without punishment and ultimately achieve a pet that is a joy to be around.

Some dogs just come about this naturally and fall into this with no problem. Others, may have the alpha personality and require much more work. But, it will definitely be worth it.

says. He loves to meet new people and other animals. He is in obedi-


other animals. He is in obedience class and is the only Chow in the group. So, he stands out. He does very well and is yet another great ambassador for the breed.
